

Coronavirus Numbers Growing At Alarming Rate

New Jersey finds itself in the midst of the second wave of the coronavirus outbreak, with an increase in new cases occurring at higher rate than when the virus first hit in March. And its impact has been felt in Pennsauken.

"Cases of the coronavirus continue to rise at alarming rates. To date, over 1,800 residents have contracted the virus since March; and 30 families in Pennsauken are mourning the loss of a loved one. There is a lot of COVID fatigue right now; as we've been fighting to slow the spread of this virus for over eight months, it's understandable. But we have to press on," said Pennsauken Mayor Tim Killion."The only way to lessen the impact of the coronavirus is to limit our risk of exposure. Wash your hands. Maintain social distancing. Wear a mask that covers your nose and mouth. We have sacrificed a lot. We need to keep doing so. It's the only way to keep ourselves, our families, and our neighbors safe."

We had an opportunity in 2020 to spark conversations that initiate change. In response to the tragic death of George Floyd, I was proud to join Chief Nettleton, members of the Pennsauken Police, and Township Committee, to walk with residents during the first ever 'Sauken in Solidarity/Black Lives Matter March and Vigil. This powerful moment was a collaborative effort; we followed the lead of students from our high school and our residents that allowed our community to rally around an extremely important cause.

It was also my somber responsibility

to represent our town as the Pennsauken community said goodbye to Rick Taylor, a man who was larger than life and meant so much to each and every one of us. And every time I've had to announce a new COVID-19 related death, my heart breaks for the families that are grieving.

But overall, the most momentous first I experienced in 2020 is a personal one: the birth of my daughter, Ashlyn. Bridget, Aiden, and I are constantly amazed with how she's enhanced our lives. It's something we'll cherish forever and look forward to watching her grow up in our Township.

Pennsauken will experience many more firsts in 2021. We have two members of Committee who are moving on. Al Dyer is the newest member of the Camden County Commissioners, formerly the Freeholders. We wish him much luck and success in his new role; there's no doubt he'll represent Pennsauken well. Betsy McBride is stepping down after nine years of dedicated service to our Township. We thank her for all of her hard work and wish her well in all of her future endeavors. We will also have two new members of Township Committee. Vince Martinez will be sworn in next month for a three-year term. We look forward to working with both him and whoever will be replacing Al. Pennsauken will also swear in a brand new mayor, who will be serving in this capacity for the first time. We'll be ready to support him or her as we all work together to make our town a great place to work and live.

County Begins Roadwork On Haddonfield Road

Last month, Camden County began roadwork on Pennsauken Township's portion of Haddonfield Rd. The project, which extends from the Rt. 90 ramp to Maple Ave., constitutes an almost \$2 million infrastructure investment.

Initially, crews will focus on constructing curbs, driveways, and ADA ramps through the end of the year. The scope of work also includes the installation of inlets and storm water pipe, as well as guide rails; concrete roadway construction; milling and resurfacing of the roadway; and putting in traffic striping, signs, and raised pavement markers.

Most of the work on Haddonfield Rd. will involve the closure of a single lane during working hours. The project is estimated to take 250 calendar days to complete.

Eagle Scout Project Upgrades Benches At Pennsauken's Liberty Park

Anthony "A.J." Marinelli, Pennsauken resident and member of Boy Scout Troop 118, completed his Eagle Scout project last month, upgrading the four wooden benches at the Veterans Memorial at Liberty Park.

"We removed all the old wood from the benches and cleaned and spray painted the frames We gave them a fresh new look," explained Marinelli. "We installed cumaru hard wood from Brazil, which should last on these benches longer than I'll be around."

Eagle Scout projects serve two purposes. Not only are they a tangible way to give back to the community in which a Scout lives, but also are the culmination of a journey that for Marinelli, started way back in kindergarten.

"I've been through Scouting ever since I was a K-Cub," said Marinelli. "Scouting has been a large part of my life and I've benefited from it, so I want to finish it and go all the way through."

According to the Boy Scouts of America's website, the rank of Eagle Scout, first created in 1912, "has represented a milestone of accomplishmentperhaps without equal-that is recognized across the country and even the world. Those who have earned the Eagle Scout rank count it among their most treasured achievements." Scouts must complete a variety of requirements before their 18th birthday, including being an active participant in Scouting; completing specific merit badges; taking on a leadership role in their Troop; as well as developing, organizing, and leading a service project. Jim Gibson, scout master for Troop 118, reflected on Marinelli's efforts to become an Eagle Scout.

During the annual task of putting up the new calendar and filling in all of the birthdays, anniversaries, and other anticipated dates, it gives us the opportunity to set some goals, based upon our experiences of the previous year. What we do is not always glamorous stuff, folks It is our goal to perform our work with as high of a standard as we can achieve. As in most businesses, the end of a calendar year is a time where an organization can look back and evaluate its strengths and identify areas in need of improvement. I'd like to take this opportunity to thank our crews for another year of committed loyalty to our residents through their work.

We all have felt the effect that the coronavirus pandemic has had on daily life; and I wish to acknowledge our diligent team here at the Department of Public Works for pushing through the protocols put in place to keep our work moving, while keeping ourselves and the general public safe. Due to this diligence, we have avoided a widespread shut down of the department, which speaks to the crew's

I sincerely hope that all of you stay safe for the remainder of the pandemic. Although 2021 will not begin with us "out of the woods" from COVID-19, we will continue to deal with the uncertainty, as a vaccine becomes available and the year progresses. It is common to wish someone prosperity in the New Year; I sincerely hope that those effected financially or medically can experience this in 2021.

Public Works is still encouraging residents to interact with our office via phone, email or Facebook messenger to keep person-to-person interactions at a minimum. We are still delivering recycling buckets to those in need of a replacement or new residents. Due to an increase in takeout meals, as well as more meals being consumed at home during shutdowns, remote learning, and employment issues, we have seen an increase in household garbage being placed at the curb. We ask for your continued diligence to properly bag your trash to keep critters away as we head into the colder months.

Reducing Plastic Bags In Recycling

Looking over our "No Plastic Bag" initiative, beginning back in August of 2019, we have seen a decrease in the amount of rejected recycling loads. There is still room left for improvement and we will continue our educational outreach into 2021 to eliminate plastic bags from the recycling buckets in Pennsauken. If you notice your neighbor places their recycling in bags, please refer them to this article or to our office. It's incredibly difficult to get the message out there to all residents without going house to house. In early November, we noticed that our contamination numbers grew due to bagged recyclables and we blitzed the routes with red tags to prevent the collection of the contaminated recycling. The current recycling contract requires less than 8 percent contamination per truck load and we're trying to get below that number. If we do not, the cost of recycling to our taxpayers will skyrocket in the next contract. By getting our numbers down now together, we can all help to reduce the impact that this will have on local taxes.

No Leaf Left Behind

I would be remiss to not mention that Public Works will continue to pick up large curbside leaf piles until Dec. 31. Those that bag their leaves can place them at the curb for Wednesday yard debris pickup by South Jersey Sanitation throughout the year. After Jan. 1, we officially switch our equipment over for winter operations and require the bagging of leaves.

Holidays And Trash/Recycling Collection

Both Christmas, Friday, Dec. 25, and New Year's Day, Friday, Jan. 1, are "trash holidays." See our "Talkin' Trash" section on this page for details. And although I will mention it again in January, live Christmas trees can be placed out on yard debris collection days. The only exception to this is if decorations, lights, tinsel are left on the tree, and/or if the tree is flocked. This means the tree needs to be placed out for trash on your trash day.

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Keep Homes Safe During Holidays With Safety Tips For Decorating

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) is issuing safety tips for holiday decorations. Holiday decorations, like candles, lights and Christmas trees, add a joyous and festive mood to the holiday season. But when these decorations are not used properly, they can cause fires, injuries and death.

Each year, hospital emergency rooms treat about 15,000 people for falls, cuts, shocks, and burns due to incidents involving faulty holiday lights, dried-out Christmas trees and other holiday decorations.

To prevent these injuries, CPSC monitors holiday lights and other decorations sold at stores and on the Internet. CPSC works with the Bureau of Customs and Border Protection to identify and detain unsafe holiday light sets posing fire risks from being distributed in the U.S.

Christmas trees are involved in about 300 fires annually, resulting in 10 deaths, 30 injuries and an average of about \$10 million in property damage and loss. In addition, there are more than 13,000 candle-related fires each year, which result in 140 deaths and \$205 million in property loss.

CPSC suggests following these tips to make your holiday a safe one.

TREES

- When purchasing an artificial tree, look for the label "Fire Resistant." Although this label does not mean the tree won't catch fire, it does indicate the tree is more resistant to burning.
- When purchasing a live tree, check for freshness. A fresh tree is green, needles are hard to pull from branches and do not break when bent between your fingers. The trunk butt of a fresh tree is sticky with resin, and when tapped on the ground, the tree should not lose many needles.
- When setting up a tree at home, place it away from fireplaces and radiators. Because heated rooms dry live trees out

rapidly, be sure to keep the stand filled with water. Place the tree out of the way of traffic and do not block doorways.

LIGHTS

- Indoors or outside, use only lights that have been tested for safety by a recognized testing laboratory, such as UL or ETL. This indicates conformance with safety standards. Use only lights that have plugs containing fuses.
- Check each set of lights, new or old, for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections. Throw out damaged sets. Always replace burned-out bulbs promptly with the same wattage bulbs.
- If using an extension cord, make sure it is rated for the intended use.
- Never use electric lights on a metallic tree. The tree can become charged with electricity from faulty lights, and a person touching a branch could be electrocuted.
- Before using lights outdoors, check labels to be sure they have been certified for outdoor use.
- Stay away from power or feeder lines leading from utility poles into older homes.
- Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, house walls, or other firm supports to protect the lights from wind damage. Use only insulated staples (not nails or tacks) to hold strings in place. Or, run strings of lights through hooks (available at hardware stores).
- Turn off all holiday lights when you go to bed or leave the house. The lights could short out and start a fire.
- Use caution when removing outdoor holiday lights. Never pull or tug on lights – this could cause stress on the connections that could create a fire hazard.
- Outdoor electric lights and decorations should be plugged into circuits protected by ground-fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) to protect against

electric shock. Portable outdoor GFCIs can be purchased where electrical supplies are sold. GFCIs can also be installed permanently to household circuits by a qualified electrician.

CANDLES AND OTHER DECORATIONS

- Use only non-combustible or flame-resistant materials to trim a tree. Choose tinsel or artificial icicles of plastic or nonleaded metals. Leaded materials are hazardous if ingested by children.
 Keep burning candles within sight.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near other evergreens. Always use non-flammable holders, and place candles out of reach of children and pets.
- In homes with small children, take special care to avoid sharp or breakable decorations, keep trimmings with small removable parts out of the reach of children who could swallow or inhale small pieces, and avoid trimmings that resemble candy or food that may tempt a child to eat them.
- To avoid eye and skin irritation, wear gloves when decorating with spun glass "angel hair."
- To avoid lung irritation, follow container directions carefully while decorating with artificial snow sprays.

FIREPLACES

- Use care with "fire salts," which produce colored flames when thrown on wood fires. They contain heavy metals that, if eaten, can cause intense gastrointestinal irritation and vomiting. Keep them away from children.
- Do not burn wrapping papers in the fireplace. Wrappings can ignite suddenly and burn intensely, resulting in a flash fire.

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AARP Tax Preparation Returns In February

Returning this February, AARP Foundation Tax-Aide provides in-person and remote tax preparation help to anyone, free of charge, with a special focus on taxpayers who are over 50 and those who have low to moderate income.

More than 36,000 volunteers provide taxpayers in nearly 5,000 communities – including Pennsauken – with free tax preparation and filing services. Tax-Aide volunteers are trained and IRS-certified every year to make sure they know about and understand the latest changes and additions to the tax code.

Because of the coronavirus pandemic,

Tax-Aide has introduced several options for providing taxpayer assistance. The options for New Jersey are:

Low Contact: Taxpayers interact with IRS-certified Tax-Aide volunteers in one or two short, in-person meetings to exchange documents, and then meet online or by phone to prepare and file taxes.

Contactless: Taxpayers interact with Tax-Aide's IRS-certified tax counselors online or by phone and exchange documents electronically.

Self-preparation: Tax-Aide provides taxpayers with free access to software so

they can prepare their own taxes Taxpayers can also request help from an IRScertified counselor to coach them through the process by phone or through computer screen-sharing.

To ensure the safety of the Tax-Aide volunteers and the taxpayers, appointments are required for all tax preparation. To request assistance for self-preparation, a taxpayer must have an email address.

More specific information for Pennsauken and Merchantville taxpayers will be provided in January. AARP Foundation's tax preparation season is from Feb. 1 through April 15.

- Keep items like blankets and flashlights handy in case of an emergency Wishing you good health and happiness. Have a wonderful holiday season.



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New Jersey, Pennsauken Exceed Expectations For 2020 Census

New Jersey's campaign to have residents participate in the 2020 Census came to a close in October. And in spite of the challenges caused by the coronavirus outbreak, residents – both here in Pennsauken and across the state – responded positively to outreach efforts.

"We were extremely pleased with how Pennsauken responded to the 2020 Census," said Township Committeewoman Betsy McBride, who helped to spearhead local Census efforts. "We are particularly grateful for the work of the Complete Count Committee Chairperson, Ken Diaz. Because of his professionalism, perseverance, and attention to detail, we were able to raise awareness, involve residents across cultures, and increase our census count in a tough year."

Based on data provided by the New Jersey Census 2020 Team, the Garden State had its best self-response rate in 30 years, greater than the 1990, 2000, and

2010 Censuses and 2.5 percent above the 2020 national self-response rate. Pennsauken residents had a self-response rate of 74.3 percent, which exceeds the town's numbers from a decade ago. And including the efforts of Census takers across the state, 99.9 percent of the households in New Jersey were counted.

"We would like to thank everyone who helped promote and facilitate the 2020 Census, given the challenges introduced by the COVID-19 pandemic. You all persevered and your efforts paid off," said Ken Diaz, chairperson of Pennsauken's Complete Count Committee. "Because of our great volunteers and the response from the Pennsauken com-

U.S. every year; 20 percent of them are relinquished because their families don't have enough time for a pet or can't handle behavior issues that come up. If you are considering giving a dog or cat as a gift, you should be 100 percent sure that your gift won't become part of that 20 percent.

Here are some ideas to consider if you would like to give a friend or loved one a pet, or the family decides they would like to add a pet. Consider giving a pet starter kit as a gift under the tree. Create a basket filled with toys, treats, leashes, and collars; a litter box; a book about the care of the pet; and other necessities for the type of pet that is wanted. Think of it as a "surprise promise." You are saying, "Guess what? We are getting a pet!" You will have all the resources you need to bring the pet home. This makes it a planned gift. For a friend or relative, you could give a card with a gift certificate from the local animal shelter that says you will pay the adoption fee for a new pet when they decide the time is right. This way, people can choose the dog or cat they want, one that they feel a bond or connection with.

Pets are great gifts for people; making it less of a surprise dramatically increases these animals' chances that have found their fur-ever home.

Think Twice About What You're Flushing

Baby wipes, disinfectant wipes, paper towels, and even "flushable" wipes, can't go down the toilet

The Pennsauken Sewerage Authority is asking residents to think twice about what they are flushing down their toilets.

Paper towels, tissues, napkins, disinfectant wipes, and even supposedly "flushable" wipes (they are not flushable or biodegradable), cannot be flushed down the toilet. The system can accommodate toilet paper, which is made to disintegrate quickly in water, but wipes and other materials, which don't break down as readily, clog pipes. That means sewer backups into the homes of the users or of others, as clogs form down the line. These blockages require jetting of the sewer main to clear.

We are seeing an increase in volume, which is to be expected given the number of people staying in their homes as part of efforts to prevent the spread of coronavirus. It's to everybody's benefit to use only toilet paper. Wipes might be able to flush, but that's when the unseen problems begin. While disposable wipes are a convenient and easy-to-use product that serve a variety of helpful purposes, they should be thrown in the trash following use. If manufacturers deem a product unsafe to go down the drain, it will be labeled on the packing. While there is debate over whether wipes labeled as "flushable" are truly safe for sewers, nonflushable products, like baby wipes, wet wipes and disinfectant wipes, are for your trash can.

In addition to stoppages in the main line, which could cause a backup into homes and businesses, the potential for widespread service interruptions are possible if these nonflushable items reach a lift station and clog a pump. Not to mention the costs associated with removing a pump to clear the clog, which

are borne by our rate payers. The Pennsauken Sewerage Authority remains available 24 hours a day to assist residents during the State of Emergency. We have enacted a "No Public Contact" policy for the protection of our neighbors and our employees, but we will respond to all requests for assistance and will advise the homeowner of our findings by telephone. COLD WEATHER TIPS

Keep your meter warm this winter! Water meters are prone to freezing, just like the pipes in your home. Keep the area around your meter warm to prevent cracks and leaks. Meters that are damaged due to freezing temperatures will be replaced at the owner's expense. Follow these tips to help prevent frozen meters and pipes this season:

- Keep the garage door closed (especially if the garage is attached to the house)
- During a deep freeze, keep the thermostat set to the same temperature day and night; lowering

the thermostat could cause pipes to freeze

- If you're going out of town, drain the water system completely; do this by shutting off the main valve and letting all the faucets in the home run until the system is empty (no more running water comes out of the tap)
- Check for and fill in holes or cracks in exterior walls and foundations to prevent cold air from coming into the walls.
- And remember to insulate and protect your water meter!



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


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The Christmas Gifts You Give Yourself

halted the use of the state's travel quarantine list and urged New Jersey residents to refrain from unnecessary interstate travel.

"Given the increased risk of spreading COVID-19 for both residents who travel outside the state and for visitors into the state, New Jersey continues to strongly discourage all non-essential interstate travel at this time," said Murphy in an online statement. "Travelers and residents returning from any U.S. state or territory beyond the immediate region (New York, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, and Delaware) should self-quarantine at their home, hotel, or other temporary lodging for the CDC recommended period, which is currently 14 days. The Department of Health will issue additional information in the coming days regarding travel precautions. Individuals should continue to abide by the state's current guidance until a new policy is issued."

Municipal Service Changes Due To COVID-19

In an announcement made on Nov. 23, Pennsauken's municipal government stated that it was taking several proactive steps, "out of an abundance of caution," after a number of employees tested positive for COVID-19 or were quarantined due to potential exposure.

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PEOPLEIN THE NEWS Pennsauken's Vitarelli Turns One Hundred Years Old

On November 14, 2020, a cavalcade of sirens, honking horns, and joyful cheers paraded past the house of Lillian Vitarelli, on the momentous occasion of her 100th birthday. The longtime Pennsauken resident was thrilled with all of the heartfelt well wishes.

"I feel wonderful, only because I've learned so much in my hundred years," said Lillian, as she reflected on reaching the century mark. "I'm not as bitter as I used to be. I've grown wiser. And I love being alive at my age!"

Pennsauken Mayor Tim Killion was on hand to read an official proclamation for Lillian in front of her children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, and friends.

"This is one of the great perks of the job. I am just privileged to be here with

all of you and with this extremely special woman, who, and I'm not just saying this, doesn't look 100 years old at all," said Killion."I understand your husband was 99; and you're 100. Whatever genes are going on in this family here, I wish I had a little bit of that."

The proclamation highlighted Lillian's century of living: being born on November 14, 1920 and growing up in South Camden: getting her cosmetology license at beauty school: meeting John Vitarelli in 1939 at the Steel Pier in Atlantic City and marrying him two years later; giving birth to Lucielle, Carole, and John; moving to Pennsauken and dedicating her love and attention to her family; and opening a beauty salon along Westfield Ave., where Macaro's Catering Hall stands today, after her children

We recently visited Chen's Garden on Union Ave., which has reopened under new management. Both of us have been going there for years and wanted to see how things have changed. We weren't disappointed.


