

Summer Fun Camp-6.5 Hours, 7 Weeks

This is a program for children in kindergarten through grade six. They will enjoy weekly field trips and visits to the Pennsauken Municipal Pool. Camp is seven weeks from 8:45 a.m. to 3:15 p.m., now through Aug. 9 at Franklin Elementary, 7201 Irving Ave. Cost is \$135 per week and includes materials, trips and snacks. Attendees must bring a packed lunch.

Bowling

This exciting camp will be at the amazing Pinsetter Bowling Center on Maple Ave. in Pennsauken. Basic bowling instruction will be provided by qualified instructors and skills competitions for prizes will be held the last day of the camp. Commander, Naval Forces Japan, Navy Region Japan acts as the Navy representative and coordinator in the area of responsibility stretching from the southern tip of the Kamchatka peninsula to the northern tip of Taiwan and promotes operability and liaises with the Japan Maritime Self Defense Force. CNFJ/CNRJ delivers vital shore readiness capabilities to the fleet, fighter and family throughout the western Pacific and Indian Ocean by optimizing available resources.

"I like being in Japan and the fact that I'm living in a foreign country is great," said Thomas."The base itself is great also because I feel like they provide a lot more services than other bases."

With more than 50 percent of the world's shipping tonnage and a third of the world's crude oil passing through the region, the United States has historic and enduring interests in this part of the world. The Navy's presence in Yokosuka is part of that long-standing commitment.

"The Navy is forward-deployed to provide security and strengthen relationships in a free and open Indo-Pacific. It's not just the ships and aircraft that have shown up to prevent conflict and promote peace," said Vice Adm. Phil

Sawyer, commander, U.S. 7th Fleet. "It is, and will continue to be our people who define the role our Navy plays around the world. People who've made a choice, and have the will and strength of character to make a difference."

Yokosuka boasts some of the largest and best of everything the Navy has to offer, according to Navy officials. More than 50 forward-deployed commands in Yokosuka support crucial operating forces, including military units from the United States Seventh Fleet, Commander Destroyer Squadron 15 and the only permanently forward-deployed aircraft carrier, USS Ronald Reagan (CVN-76).

The challenge of providing extended service to the fleet overseas is met in a high operating tempo thanks to an exceptional U.S. and Japanese workforce, Navy officials explained. Yokosuka's strategic location and support capabilities allow operating forces to be 17 days closer to locations in Asia than their counterparts based in the continental United States.

As a member of one of the U.S. Navy's most relied upon assets, Thomas and other sailors know they are part of a legacy that will last beyond their lifetimes contributing to the Navy the nation needs.

"I want to serve in the Navy to continue a proud family tradition," added Thomas.

SENIORCORNER Keeping Cool: Summer Safety For Seniors

Summer fun is finally here, but it also can pose some challenges for seniors.

Excessive hot and humid weather can be extremely tough on older people. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 61 percent of heat related deaths occur in Americans 55 vears or older. Normally, the body has several ways to keep itself cool. Sweating is the most important of these; but as people grow older, their ability to sweat decreases. Seniors also tend not to get as thirsty, so they drink less water, which decreases sweating even further.

In addition, older people often take medications that interfere with sweating,

such as antihistamines, certain tranquilizers, and heart and blood pressure medications. It's important to speak with your physician about how medications can affect your ability to stay cool. Seniors can protect themselves during hot weather by following some common

I just read that Florida tomatoes are always picked green and then gassed with ethylene to give them that "normal" looking red color, right before

being shipped out across the country. In some cases, they're picked after a longer vine-ripening time-frame, but then they have to be refrigerated before they get shipped, which degrades some of the taste and nutrients from tomatoes every single time.

Our beloved local farmers can afford to allow for a longer ripening on the vine period, which will always lead to a juicier, vummier, and tastier tomato.

My mother often told me that IF I had to buy a store tomato. I was to close my eyes and give it a good whiff. And, if it didn't have that heavenly tomato fragrance, don't buy it!

So, lucky for us, our local farmers deliver the goods in more ways than one. And when they do make those much anticipated deliveries, keep these two things in mind: do not refrigerate your tomatoes and do not set them out on a sunny window sill when you bring them home. They only require sun while they're on the vine.

And, now that I'm bragging about all

things wonderful from the Garden State, let's add to that list actors Mervl Streep. John Travolta, and Bruce Willis. Also, our fabulously delicious Jersey corn, those mouth-watering blueberries, and on top of all that, we're the "Diner Capital of the World!"

Doggie Do's And Don'ts When Walking Your Four-Legged Friend

It's a common sense rule designed for the safety of you and your dog, as well as other people and their pets.

When choosing a lease to walk your dog, avoid retractable leashes altogether.

If you really need a place for your dog to run around, Pennsauken Township has the Bow Wow Dog Park, located at 2601 Cooper Ave. The park has fenced in locations for both small- and largesized dogs to run and play. Just make sure they're on a leash when you enter and leave.

Taking A Journey To Address Abandoned And Vacant Properties

I've been told that rushing into something just to get to the good part deprives you of the value of the journey and the things you can learn along the way. Patience and flexibility will allow you to enjoy the journey and maybe teach you things that you would otherwise never learn.

Over the years, I've read many books on this topic and there are a few common messages, one of which is to always keep in mind the reason the journey began in the first place. Another is everyone needs to learn to embrace change. Lastly, every good journey needs a good plan.

Having a plan, setting a goal, identifying the obvious changes, and anticipating as many obstacles as you can, is the first place to start. Never abandon your plan. Adjust as you need to, but stay true to what you set your sights on. It will be worth it in the end.

Be flexible. As in any situation that involves change, you just don't know what adjustments may need to happen along the way. Your time line may need adjusting because of some unforeseen issue or the funding that you were counting on may no longer be available. Flexibility can get you over those hurdles.

Clear and honest communication is

critical. When people know where they stand and where they're going, they will work through the obstacles with you. When people want to be a part of your journey, they will always find a way to understand the obstacles and to make sure that you know no matter what happens, they don't want out; they want to be a part of the journey. The plan you put in place is their plan as well; they are in this with you over the long term. no matter what happens along the way.

You're probably wondering, why this article is talking about journeys and change? It's because our program has been through a lot, with more to come. We started our journey with very defined goals. Once achieved, we reset our expectations on what this program could accomplish for the Township.

We now have an online rental registration program. Year to date, that program has generated 90 more rental registrations then we had a year ago for that same time frame.

The next step of that program is to identify all unregistered properties, either rental or vacant. Our partners at ProChamps have mailed out postcards to all "Not Owner Occupied" (NOO) properties. An NOO can be identified as: the owner's address on the deed is different than the property being identified; the utilities for the property are being paid by someone other than the owner: and/or the property was found as a rental listing on the MLS records, to mention a few.

One of the benefits to this has been helping property owners correct the mailing address on their property deed. It has also given us the opportunity to ensure that people who are planning on selling their property have a clear understanding of what is required by the Township to ensure they are ready for closing.

We took the advice of a concerned citizen and put a new grass cut program in place. So far, so good. We have been able to control our expenses and make a bigger impact within each neighborhood. We've also started a grass cut hotline, giving our residents a direct line to getting the problem properties in their neighborhoods addressed quicker. If you would like to tell us about a problem

We've started demolishing some of the town's most dilapidated structures. You may have seen the two houses that were on the corner of Chapel and Magnolia Ave. are now gone. We worked with the banks that owned those properties and negotiated the demolition at no cost to the Township. The removal of these properties has cleaned up that space and made it easier to see the oncoming traffic.

We are also working on the buildable vacant lots in town. Whether it is a business or residential opportunity, it is our goal to turn those lots into productive use.

So, the journey continues with more to come. With each step, there has been change; some small, some significant. Some easy, some more complicated; but in the end, we had the support and backing of our Committee members and Township leaders. It has taken the partnerships of almost all of the Township's departments and some great concerned citizens to get us this far in our journey. Be sure to stay tuned for the next steps.

Remember, nothing is impossible. With the right mind set, a good plan. some flexibility, clear and honest communication, and a lot of patience, anything is possible and everything will work out in the end.

The Pennsauken Sewerage Authority is responsible for the operation and maintenance of the sanitary sewage collection system in our service area. The sanitary sewage collection system is made up of main lines, force mains and pumping stations.

The homeowner owns and therefore is responsible for the operation and maintenance of the lateral line from their dwelling up to and including the connection to the main line.

The rules and regulations of the Pennsauken Sewerage Authority require a back flow prevention device commonly referred to as a "back check valve" be installed whenever plumbing fixtures are located below street level, such as in the basement. PSA strongly recommends all our customers have a back check valve installed to prevent contamination in the event of a main line stoppage.

The discharge of water collected in a sump pit to the sanitary sewage collection system is prohibited.

Cooking grease poured down the drain can cause a blockage of the lateral line. Please dispose of grease properly.




Prices are pretty standard for a more

Depression is a mood disorder that ranges widely in severity. If you have a milder case, you may struggle with persistent feeling of sadness, irritability, anger, loss of interest. and fatigue that can last for weeks or longer. Depression can interfere with your daily life and relationships.

Depression affects how you feel, think and behave and can lead to a variety of emotional and physical problems. You may have trouble doing normal day-to-day activities, and sometimes you may feel as if life isn't worth living.

Some other intense symptoms can cause lack of appetite and weight loss, sleep problems, and frequent thoughts of death or suicide.

Symptoms Of Depression

- Insomnia or sleeping a lot more/not wanting to get up
- Irritability
- · Loss of interest in activities that used to be enjoyable/not wanting to leave the house
- Hopelessness
- Persistent thoughts of something bad happening
- Thoughts of death or suicide or suicide attempts
- In very severe cases, psychotic symptoms, such as hallucinations or delusions
- · Inability to take care of oneself, such as eating, bathing, or fulfilling family or

• Unexplained physical problems, such

work responsibilities

as back pain or headaches

How To Combat Depression

There's no sure way to prevent depression. However, these strategies may help.

Take steps to control stress, to increase your resilience and boost your self-esteem. For example, try walking 30-60 minutes a day, especially out in the sunshine.

Reach out to family and friends, especially in times of crisis, to help you weather rough spells.

Get treatment at the earliest sign of a problem to help prevent depression from your physician.

Allow yourself to be angry. This can be healthy when you're depressed, even if the people around you don't like it. You can tell when the anger is healthy because it will feel good. Remember `though, choosing to be angry and what you are angry about is no one else's fault,

so don't beat up others with your anger. Pay attention to those things that feel good. You'll notice that if a problem truly requires your attention at any given time, it will feel good to focus on it.



GOINGGREEN Soap Making A Fun And Clean Summer Project

Now that summer is upon us, we're outside playing in the sun, sand, and gardens. This outdoor play leads to sweat and grime accumulating on us and our clothing. Consider making your own soap to get clean; it's easy, frugal, creative, and fulfilling. There's something satisfying about taking a bar of your own homemade soap into the bath or shower with you.

Whether you are looking for a more natural alternative to commercial soap. which can be irritating to sensitive skin, or are a creative person looking for a new adventure, making soap is fun and not too complicated. Homemade soap has character. It smells good, feels good, and can make a nice present for friends and family.

Making soap is a basic chemical reaction between fats or oils and lye. Carefully choose a combination of quality oils, add your favorite fragrance or essential oils, swirl in a lively colorant, and your soap suddenly takes on that charming character that commercially manufactured soap can't even begin to compete with.

There are four basic methods for making soap. The easiest is called melt and pour, which is a process where pre-made blocks of soap are melted, and fragrance is added to customize the base for personal taste. Cold processing is the most common method of making soap from scratch with oils and lye. Hot processing is a variation of the cold process method, where the soap is cooked in a crockpot or oven. Re-batching is grinding up bars or leftover pieces of soap, adding milk or water, and re-blending them.

Each method has pros, cons, and variations. Regardless of the method chosen, be sure to use utensils, pots, and pans dedicated to soap making, since ingredients are not edible. Residue leftover from soap making should never be combined with food. Second hand pots, pans, and utensils can be purchased inexpensively at thrift stores, and kept segregated from those used to prepare food. Safety goggles and dish gloves are good precautions as well.

Reviewing the basics of the two most popular methods, melt and pour and cold process, will help to decide which approach is appropriate for you.

Melt and pour soap making with a melt and pour base is like making a cake with a cake mix. What you lose in control of your ingredients and customization of your recipe, you make up for in safety, ease, and convenience. This is a good approach for beginners, before moving on to more complex methods. With melt and pour soap making, pre-made blocks of uncolored, unscented soap base are purchased from a craft store or soap supplier. The soap base is melted in a double boiler. When the soap is fully melted, add fragrance and color. Pour into a mold, and voilá, you're done. The soap is ready to use as soon as it hardens.

Cold process soap making is a little more complicated and requires learning a few techniques of the craft first. Heat the oils in your soap pot until they're approximately 100 degrees, measuring the temperature with a deep fry thermometer. Slowly add a lye and water mixture and blend until it thickens. Add fragrance, color, and additives and pour it into the mold. The raw soap will take about 24 hours to harden and about four additional weeks to cure before it's ready to use. While the newly made soap is curing, wrap the pieces in scraps of material tied with bits of ribbon and tuck them into dresser drawers to provide a wonderful fragrance each time the drawer is opened.

Whichever method is chosen, you can make great soap. Work patiently and follow the instructions closely, which are readily available on the internet. Once you're familiar with the basic steps, you'll be able to let your creative inspirations flow and make all sorts of wonderful soap creations.

"By the power invested in me, I hereby declare the Class of 2019 to be graduates of Pennsauken High School, with all honor, entitlements, and bears."

Young went on to say that the graduates had been given all of the academic tools necessary to arrive at this moment; and that when the ceremony was over, each one of them would continue to build on that foundation. But this wonderful accomplishment was just the beginning.

"What you have already learned is just the launching point to your future. But the world is a much bigger place; and it's easy to lose focus and forget the fundamentals that will make your life truly a contented one," said Young. After an amazing performance of the song, "This is Me," by members of Pennsauken High School's Double Dozen, directed by Kate Brown and Dyan Conklin, the crowd heard from two student speakers: Dairon Estevez, valedictorian; and Ngan Chiem, salutorian, both of whom reflected on the last four years, the future that awaited them, and the loved ones, teachers, and classmates who helped them prepare for the steps ahead.

Estevez has the distinction of following in the footsteps of his brother, Ronald, who was valedictorian of Pennsauken High School's Class of 2018. Having siblings go back-to-back as valedictorian is an accomplishment that has never happened before in the history of the District.

"To my brother, Ronnie, thank you for coming down from Hoboken to see me graduate," said Estevez, who will be attending Columbia University in the fall. "You stood in my valedictory shoes just one year before me. Thank you for being my role model, to being a friend, and for giving me really great advice.

"The last four years of my life have been memorable and the next four will be daunting, but I am sure, exhilarating. I am not the only one who has ever been scared to leave home for college, the military, or the workforce after high school. It will not be easy for us as young adults, nor will it be easy for our parents, who will miss us when we go. After all, this is what makes graduation so intensely bitter sweet. We are all leaving here tonight with a community, achievement, and a significant contribution to be what 'Pennsauken Pride' will be to future generations."

Ngan Chiem spoke about her experience visiting her "future home," Princeton University, and keeping the perspective on what this opportunity truly means to her.

"As a child of Vietnamese immigrants, I've grown up knowing hard work is the only currency the poor have to give ourselves a better future," said Chiem. "I've worked incredibly hard for Princeton, but never once did it escape me that a million things had to go right for me to be where I am today. That I'm not so much a smart person, though I've grown more confident in that leap over the years, than I am a lucky one to have the right people in my life, who have encouraged and inspired me to work hard and have shaped me into the woman I am today.

"To my fellow classmates, I know we've all shared the same hallways for four years; we've all asked each other for a ride at one point; and we've all swapped jokes with our friends at the lunch table, laughing as if we'll always have another Monday together. Or maybe we laughed because we were so grateful to have this one. We might not stay in touch, but that's the beauty of friendships. They don't need to last forever to change your life, to give you the courage to walk towards the future."

Dr. Ronnie Tarchichi, superintendent of schools for the Pennsauken School District, took the opportunity to recognize the students in cap and gown, as well as those who helped bring the graduates to where they are today.

"Congratulations, Class of 2019 and congratulations on your graduation being held here at the Liacouras Center. You fought for it. This will spark a new tradition for years to come for the graduates of Pennsauken High School and they have you to thank.

"Congratulations also to all the parents and all the educators who have been a brick in the foundation of who you are today and who you will become."

Trash Holidavs

Independence Day, Thursday, July 4, is a trash holiday. This means that Thursday's trash and recycling collection route will occur on Friday, July 5; and that Friday's collection will be pushed back to Saturday, July 6. The trash holidays each year are as follows: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, and Christmas Day. This information is typically found in the "Talking Trash" portion of All Around Pennsauken. Our office staff changes our answering machine message the week of one of these holidays, in an effort to

pass-along information while the office is closed.

Litter. Vacant Homes Selling. And You

With the opportunity of new families seeing Pennsauken for the first time, possibly purchasing one of the dozens of previously vacant homes that have been rehabbed and are for sale around town. I offer this perspective: what will the new potential buyers see when they tour the newly-listed house? I think back to when I purchased my first home in Pennsauken. Perhaps you did the same. Aside from the house itself, I looked at the entire neighborhood for that "feel." It's a purposeful scan to see how much care each resident puts into their property. Do residents pick up those circulars thrown onto the driveway? Are there windblown recyclables along the curb line? These are the little things that can affect a new family's decision whether to choose to purchase in your neighborhood-or even in Pennsauken. Financial burdens, age, and disabilities are all cases where properties can begin to look tired. If you know of a neighbor struggling, reach out; pick up that stray soda can you've walked by twice this week-even though it's not your responsibility. These simple acts, taking up mere seconds of your day, can have a positive impact on your neighborhood and work to make Pennsauken a place we and future homeowners are proud to call "home." For the big clean up jobs, a call to Pennsauken's Property Maintenance Department can begin an official process to address a problem property. Public Works will likely be dispatched to perform a "clean n' lien" once the conformance time has expired.

"Grasscvcling"

Yard debris is collected by South Jersey Sanitation every week on Wednesdays, unless it's pushed back due to a trash holiday. Grass clippings should be bagged or placed in a can, weighing less than 50 pounds. I have been practicing a new routine during my weekly grass cutting called "grasscycling." Grasscycling is the natural recycling of grass by leaving clippings on the lawn when mowing. Clippings decompose quickly, returning valuable nutrients back to the soil such

as nitrogen and potassium.

I cut my lawn from April through November and I will save roughly 84 trash bags, which will equate to around \$47 for the season. I'm seeing some results in the back yard with this "natural" fertilizer and I noticed something else that I save... time! The backyard takes me about 15 less minutes to cut since I do not have to stop to bag the clippings when the bag gets full. The weekly muscle-man challenge of carrving those bags from the back vard to the curb on Tuesday evenings is also removed from my schedule. If this works out, I may continue the trend on the front yard and save more! Just make sure those clippings do not make their way into the storm sewer inlets.

Pennsauken EMT In Need Of A Kidney Transplant

Juan Vasquez, an EMT for Pennsauken EMS, has lived in town for almost two decades. A member of Pennsauken High School's Class of 2004, he married his high school sweetheart, Kelly, and has two boys, ages 10 and 1.

He's also in need of a kidney transplant.

Vasquez has lupus, an autoimmune disease that attacks tissues and organs in the body. The disease has severely affected his kidneys, which are functioning at only 5 percent.

"Throughout time, the lupus took my kidneys away," says Vasquez, "I've been on dialysis since December of 2018."

Juan was a very active husband and dad and trained in Brazilian Jujitsu as a black belt before his kidneys failed. He's currently on disability, as he underwent surgery to switch over to home he-

modialysis, which will perform the job his kidneys can't do now: purify his blood. His family has been tested to become live donors for him, but they haven't passed for various reasons; one of which is that Vasquez has an O positive blood type, which is difficult to match.

"To get a live donor, that would be the best case scenario," explains Vasquez. "A kidney from a live donor will last about 15 years. One from a cadaver lasts from eight to ten. A live kidney donation gives you a longer life expectancy. I get to be with my family longer."

Those interested in pursuing the donation process can contact Lourdes at (856) 796-9370, press 4, and ask about donating to Juan Vasquez. To directly donate to Juan, individuals will need to have an O positive blood type. There's also the option for a paired kidney exchange, or "kidney swap," where a living kidney donor is incompatible with a re-

cipient, but they can exchange kidneys with another donor/recipient pair.

"I appreciate anybody who would take the time to consider donating a kidney. It means a lot," adds Vasquez."If not for me, then maybe they can help someone else in need of a donation."
